**Hans Christian Andersen and Community Anne Klara Bom 2020-01-07** The theme of community has perhaps never been of a more vital significance than in our present day and age. Today, we might be facing the culmination of this process. The spectres of nationalism are undermining various national and international communities. Inequality is on the rise.
